The Illinois General Assembly recognized that the welfare, health, prosperity, moral, and general well-being of all the people in the State of Illinois are largely dependent upon the orderly development (economic, social, environmental) of the Southwestern Illinois Metropolitan and regional counties. In order to provide for such development in the southwestern Illinois region, it is imperative that sound, comprehensive, general and functional plans for the area are devised to guide and coordinate the development of our region.

SIMAPC specializes in planning for the following areas; adequate air and water resources, quality and supply; public utility distribution system or systems; storm water and sewage disposal; surface drainage control and flood abatement; integrated air, water, rail and highway transportation; the orderly arrangements of land for residential, commercial, industrial, public and other purposes; local municipal and governmental services; the provision of social services; stimulation of economic development; improvement of environmental quality, urban esthetics and civic design; and may change to align with future developments.

Our Value as an Economic Development District

As the Southwestern Illinois Metropolitan and Regional Planning Commission (SIMAPC), we are tasked with compiling and updating the Comprehensive Economic Development Strategy (CEDS) every five years. This ongoing responsibility ensures that we stay focused on the economic growth of the seven-county Southwestern Illinois region. The CEDS outlines a shared vision aimed at creating jobs, diversifying the economy, improving living conditions, and enhancing overall regional prosperity.

SIMAPC holds a special designation as an Economic Development District (EDD), a status granted by the U.S. Economic Development Administration (EDA). This designation, earned through developing a CEDS that meets EDA's criteria, allows our seven-county region to apply for and receive crucial assistance through EDA programs including Public Works and Economic Adjustment programs. Being an EDD significantly enhances the region's ability to secure federal resources and support for key projects that drive economic progress.

The CEDS itself is a strategic document that examines the region's demographics and economic indicators, identifies strengths, weaknesses, opportunities, and threats, and lays out clear regional goals and priorities for future growth. It provides a guiding framework for regional economic development efforts.

As the designated EDD for Southwestern Illinois, SIMAPC plays a pivotal role in fostering collaboration between local jurisdictions, economic development organizations, and the EDA. By aligning regional priorities with federal funding opportunities, SIMAPC ensures that the region secures investments that support long-term economic growth.

Additionally, SIMAPC's responsibility to update and submit the CEDS every five years underscores our commitment to strong communication and outreach. This ensures that the region fully benefits from the resources and support available from the EDA and other partners.

The CEDS document serves as a public resource and will be readily available for stakeholders to consult as they make decisions aimed at improving the regional economy. Its transparency allows local decision-makers to use it as a strategic guide for fostering economic growth and resilience.





Fiscal Review





The 2024 fiscal year was a transitional year for the Commission, as the organization operated with an interim director and limited internal staff. The Commission focused on building out the Executive Committee and hiring an Executive Director to drive the organization forward. The Commission transitioned office spaces to better manage expenses and streamlined technology infrastructure to reduce excessive cost. As the Commission continues into the 2025 fiscal year, our financial reporting process has been simplified to deliver a stronger overview in relation to budget comparison and revenue projections.

Completed Project: Washington County Hazard Mitigation Plan

The Washington County Hazard Mitigation Plan was successfully completed, providing a comprehensive strategy to reduce the risks and impacts of natural disasters in the county. The plan outlines critical actions to improve community resilience, protect lives and property, and secure funding for mitigation projects. This effort involved collaboration between local governments and stakeholders to ensure a safer future for Washington County residents.

Completed Project: Nashville Water Treatment Plant Enhancements

The Nashville, Illinois Water Treatment Plant upgrade was funded by the Illinois Department of Commerce through the CDBG program. The project improved the facility's infrastructure by enhancing water quality and reliability for local residents while ensuring compliance with environmental standards.

Active Project: Kaskaskia Regional Port District

The Kaskaskia Regional Port District has received an Economic Development Administration grant to fund the construction of a laydown yard to supply the plant with storage for coiled steel and a second entrance road at KRPD Dock 2 which is aimed at enhancing capacity and improving infrastructure at one of the port's key terminals.

Active Project: Baldwin Sewer Project

The Village, covering 0.67 square miles, faces issues with its lift station and gravity sewer system leading to wastewater backups during heavy rains. To resolve this the Village plans to extend the force main to the wastewater treatment plant (WWTP) and upgrade pump impellers. This cost-effective solution is contingent on funding with a grant from the Energy Community Transition Program and anticipated support from the Delta Regional Authority (DRA).

Active Project: Village of Dupo Industrial Drive Resurfacing

The Industrial Drive Improvements Project is approximately 2.121 miles long beginning 1000-ft north of the S. Main St. intersection northerly to the curve at Falling Springs Rd. The project involves HMA pavement patching, 2-ft widening, milling and overlay, 2-ft wide aggregate shoulders, culvert removal and replacement, fence removal and replacement, and other miscellaneous items. This project is funded from the Department of Commerce and Economic Development Rebuild Illinois Grant.

Active Project: Randolph County Care Center Renovation

Randolph County, Illinois is transforming an unused portion of its county-owned nursing home into a state-of-the-art behavioral health center to address growing local needs by providing critical long-term mental health care while revitalizing the facility and supporting the community. The project was funded through multiple grants including federal funding from the American Rescue Plan Act and the Delta Regional Authority.

Active Project: Clinton County Hazard Mitigation Plan

The update of Clinton County's Hazard Mitigation Plan is currently underway, aiming to reassess and improve strategies to reduce the risks of natural disasters. This ongoing process involves collaboration among local governments, emergency responders, and stakeholders to identify vulnerabilities and develop action plans for enhancing community safety. Once completed the updated plan will provide Clinton County with a stronger framework for disaster preparedness and access to additional funding for mitigation efforts.



Active Project: Comprehensive Economic Development Plan

We are actively engaging stakeholders in the development of a new Comprehensive Economic Development Strategy (CEDS) for our region, funded by the Economic Development Administration (EDA). This process involves gathering input from local governments, businesses, and community leaders to create a unified vision for economic growth. As part of this effort, we are also introducing branding under the theme "Stronger Together: A Blueprint for Economic Growth," which will guide our regional development priorities and foster a cohesive identity for future growth initiatives.

Recently Awarded: Sauget Monsanto Avenue

The sewer lining project in Sauget covers 2,004 linear feet along Monsanto Avenue in the Sauget Industrial Park targeting three areas to alleviate flooding and improve infrastructure. This effort is vital to sustaining the industrial park's operations, retaining 2,000 jobs, and creating an additional 50 jobs. By enhancing the sewer system, the project supports the park's economic stability and growth by ensuring a more resilient infrastructure for continued industrial activities.

Awaiting Award: Randolph County Workforce Development Plan

The grant application to the Delta Regional Authority seeks funding for a workforce development plan in Randolph County, with Southwestern Illinois College (SWIC) as a supportive partner. The initiative aims to address local workforce needs by enhancing training programs supported by data from the Workforce Innovation and Opportunity Act (WIOA). This plan focuses on preparing the local labor force for emerging opportunities and strengthening the region's economic resilience through targeted workforce development efforts.



Awaiting Award: Bioeconomy Development Opportunity Zone

The grant proposal to the Delta Regional Authority seeks funding to establish a Bioeconomy Development Opportunity Zone by assessing agricultural residues and marketing the region for bio-manufacturing. It includes identifying an industrial site for bio-manufacturing and leverages the Kaskaskia Port District's strategic strengths. The Leadership Council of Southwestern Illinois is a pivotal partner in this initiative and is working collaboratively to promote the region's bioeconomic potential and attract investment for sustainable growth and innovation in bio-manufacturing.

Awaiting Award: Water Quality Management Program

The Southwestern Illinois Metropolitan and Regional Planning Commission is seeking grant funding from the Illinois Environmental Protection Agency to support a three-county Water Quality Management Program for Madison, Monroe, and St. Clair Counties. This program will align with the Illinois EPA Water Quality Management Plan by introducing Clean Water STEM Kits for schools, developing a Stormwater Story Map for St. Clair County, and updating the Water Quality Management Plan for the region. The initiative aims to enhance water quality, engage the community in sustainable practices, and ensure long-term environmental resilience.

Awaiting Award: Kaskaskia Port District

The grant proposal to the Delta Regional Authority, in partnership with Egyptian Electric and the Kaskaskia Port District, aims to fund electrical enhancements to support the expansion of TMW. This project will help boost local infrastructure by enabling the creation of 25 new jobs and enhancing the operational capacity of the Kaskaskia Port District which is vital to the region's industrial growth. This collaborative effort will strengthen the area's economic foundation while supporting long-term development and job creation.

Awaiting Advancement: Nashville Emergency Shelter

The community of Nashville, Illinois has submitted a pre-application for BRIC (Building Resilient Infrastructure and Communities) funding to address mitigation strategies outlined in the Washington County Hazard Mitigation Plan. They are currently awaiting an invitation to advance to the full application stage. This funding would support critical infrastructure improvements to mitigate disaster risks and enhance long-term resilience for Nashville and the surrounding area.




